From the Director

We welcomed 2022 with open arms because although COVID is still out there and still a concern, we were able to put the restrictions behind us and begin to operate Normally. Some of our beloved events, like Community Day, Touch a Truck and Haunted Trail, that we hadn't been able to offer for nearly two years were back in action. The participation numbers show that the community was just as happy as we were that the restrictions were lifted and our events were in full swing.

As you will see through out this report there were a number of projects and improvements done throughout the department in 2022. There were however, a couple of projects that were deferred to 2023, the gym painting and mats, which will be combined with the Recreation Center flooring and done as one project in 2023.

Although 2022 was a good year for the parks and Recreation Department, it was not without its challenges and disappointments. Staffing continued to be a challenge. We continued to struggle finding part-time staff to work at the Community Recreation Center and the Tennis Center. We continued to advertise and interview as applications came in but unfortunately they were sparse. A third full-time Desk Attendant had been approved to share between the Recreation Center and the Tennis Center, and in the fall of 2022 we were permitted to advertise to try and fill this position. An offer was made and accepted with our new employee slated to begin in January 2023. This will help get us closer to the two deep coverage requirement as outlined in the Youth Protection Policy. There seemed to be more applications coming in at the end of the year, we hope to be able to be fully staffed sometime in 2023.

Our Tennis Center had been without a Manager for some time, the facility as well as its participation had been in decline. In 2022 we hired a new Racquet sports Manager, he began in February and throughout the year, he worked on bringing in new Tennis Pros, making some much needed improvements at the Tennis Center and turning around the participation. Things now seem to be moving in the right direction once again.

A new Assistant Parks and Recreation Director was hired in 2022 and began working in June. He has been learning the ropes and getting to know the 10 youth sports associations that we work with. He has been actively pursuing new instructors to enhance our instructor based program offerings.

The Aquatic Facility that we had been working to design with the intent to construct had been ongoing since 2020. We received word that we had been awarded \$3,200,000 in grants for this project, which was very exciting news. Unfortunately when we went back out to bid after some revisions to the original design, the bids came back way over budget. So the potential for this project happening soon no longer looks promising.

2019 was a very successful year for Recreation Revenues and although we strived to meet or beat that number the last couple of years, we were not able to because of the COVID restrictions. I am happy to report that in 2022 we hit the ground running and that we not only met the 2019 number, but surpassed it by almost \$30,000. We have so many new and exciting things on the horizon we cannot wait to see what 2023 and the next several years hold for the Parks and Recreation Department.

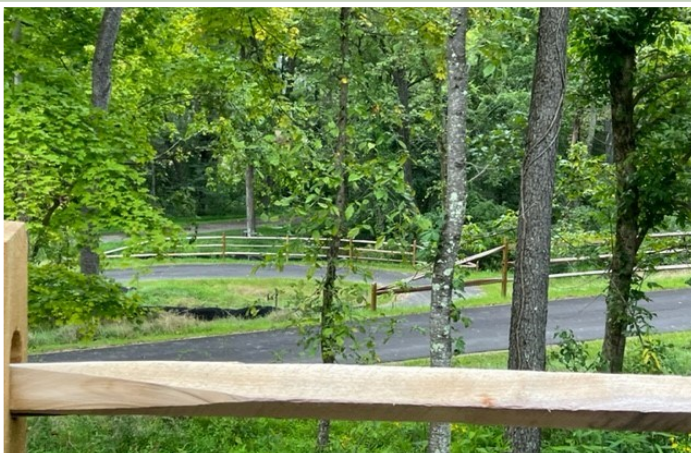
In the Peters Township Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan that was completed in 2016 it identified that there was a need for additional park property on the western portion of the Township. Shortly after that plan was completed, the Township became aware that the former Rolling Hills Country Club was selling their property. This property is located in an area that would fulfill our needs. The Township and the School District worked together to acquire the former Rolling Hills Country Club property with the intent to build a new High School on one half and develop the other as a community park to be named Rolling Hills Park. In 2018 Mackin Engineering completed the Master Plan for Rolling Hills Park.



ROLLING HILLS Park Development

The first obstacle that needed to be tackled was the main roadway that would connect from East McMurray Road to Center Church Road and would service both the High School and the park. This project was a joint effort between the School District and Township and was not free from challenge, but all worked out in the end. In 2020 after Rolling Hills Drive construction was underway, the Township went out to bid for the development of phase 2 Rolling Hills Park. Phase 2 includes the roadways, walking and biking paths (including connection to the Arrowhead Trail), infrastructure, a Park Maintenance Building as well as the Great Lawn area. The Great Lawn area includes three picnic shelters, a playground, a restroom facility, outlook areas and terminus features. Construction began early 2021 and continued through

the summer of 2022. Although only a small portion of what is identified in the master plan has been built, the park has really taken shape. The shelters turned out very nice and the trail connector is a unique and wonderful connection to the Arrowhead trail. The Walking and biking paths through the park will get an abundance of use. We are currently waiting on the park amenities and establishment of turf throughout. We are working on moving some of our existing events to Rolling Hills Park in 2023 as well as adding new programming and events there as well. We look forward to officially opening in 2023.



Rolling Hills Park Aquatic Facility

An aquatic facility has always been a hot topic in Peters Township and one of the most requested facilities by the community members, including in the most recent Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan. The main constraint to building this type of facility has always been that we simply did not have property to properly house it. When the Township decided to purchase the Rolling Hills property for the purpose of a community park, this constraint no longer existed. When we hired Mackin Engineering to do a Master Plan for the park, they were instructed to dedicate space in the plan for an aquatic facility. Mackin completed this plan in 2018.

In 2020 a design team led by Kimmel Bogrette Architecture + Site was hired by the Township to design an aquatic facility for Rolling Hills Park. Once the project design was complete it was sent out to bid, however when we opened bids, the cost of the project was significantly higher than anticipated. So at the direction of Council in 2021 we held an open house and conducted a survey to gain input on what those in the community prioritized. We then went back to the drawing board to adjust the scale of the project with the intent to bring the cost within the anticipated budget. The design firm had the revisions mostly complete by the end of 2021. At the end of the year we were notified of 2 significant grants that the Township was awarded for this aquatic facility. First was a \$2million RCAP grant and second was a \$631,000 grant from the DCNR. There was one final grant that we had applied for that we had not been notified about before the end of the year, however, since then we have been informed that we received an additional \$200,000 from the Washington County LSA Grant. We were informed by the DCNR that we would be able to apply once again for additional funding for the project. So an additional grant application was submitted and we were notified in 2022 that we had received an additional \$369,000 bringing our total grant funding for this project to \$3,200,000. In the fall of 2022 we sent the project back out to bid, unfortunately with rising costs and difficulty finding contractors able to do projects at this time, instead of a cost reduction the project costs soared and the possibility of this project happening at this time looked even more grim. The Township Council will act on this in early 2023. If the project is not constructed, it is the intent to reserve property for future development of that facility within Rolling Hills Park.



Peterswod Park Improvements

In the fall of 2022 we received notice that we were awarded a matching grant of \$650,000 for improvements to fields 1 and 2 in Peterswood Park. The amenities at fields 1 and 2 are older and showing signs of aging as well as wear and tear. It is has been on our list of projects to replace the dugouts and press box buildings. The lights on those fields were installed in June of 2007, they are older the lamps don't last as long and they are not nearly as efficient as the new systems available now. And although the restroom and concession building has seen many coats of paint and repairs over the years, you can definitely see its age. With this grant the dugouts and press boxes will be replaced, the light fixtures will be replaced and restroom and concession building will get a facelift.

A couple of years ago the Baseball Association approached the Township wanting to turf the infield of field 2, the Township hired Mackin Engineering to design the project, but unfortunately when sent out to bid, the amount came in higher than the Baseball Association was able to commit to. The turf of field 2 infield will be part of this grant project. Now, in light of this project, the Baseball Association is also interested in turfing the infield of field 1, with 2 turf infields the Washington County Pony League might consider doing tournaments at our facilities. As a result, field one will be included in this project as an add alternate and will be included if Baseball decides to help fund that portion of the project. The Township will work closely with the Baseball Association through the planning and design process of this project, which we plan to work on throughout 2023 with the intent to construct in 2024.



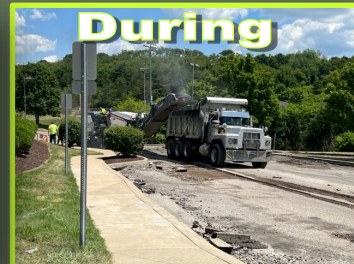
Park Improvements

The Peters Township Community Recreation center opened to the public in 2004 and has served many community members and guests since. With regular maintenance and improvements the facility has maintained its integrity. But after so many years of use, the concrete pad and front parking lot began to show wear. In 2022 the concrete pad was removed and a new pad was installed. The front Parking lot was milled and re-paved. During this project, we had to make adjustments for those visiting the Recreation Center, participants and members had to enter the facility through the side doors (facing Meredith Drive), this is not an ideal situation because we do not have appropriate handicap access from the parking lot into those doors, but we helped the members that needed assistance to get into the facility and made it work until the project was complete. Along with this project, the connection from the Community Recreation Center to the Arrowhead Trail was re-paved.

In 2021 the front doors of the Community Recreation Center were replaced with some of the CARES Act money that the Township received for COVID. This provided a no touch access to the facility that we did not have prior, as well as ADA access. When the doors were installed, there was nothing in place to keep the cold air out and the warm air in, during the cold winter months. Because the doors would stay open longer with the automatic system than they did with the manual doors, the cold air was coming in, the lobby and hallways were very cold. In 2022 we had air curtains installed above the exterior set of automatic doors. This year has not been as cold, however, it does seem to make a difference.

Administration

In 2022 staffing continued to be a challenge. Our Youth Protection Policy requires that we have two deep adult coverage at all times. Because we have had such a difficult time hiring part-time staff we have not been able to meet that requirement. In 2022 we hired 2 full-time Desk Attendants. These were new positions created to help with the staffing shortages that we had. Council had approved for a third full-time Desk Attendant, but we hadn't filled that position. Since we continued to struggle with hiring and coverage, in the fall of 2022 we were authorized to move forward with the hiring of that third position. By the end of 2022 we made an offer to Patty Cavolo, who accepted our offer. Patty is slated to begin work in early 2023. As we reached the end of the year, more and more applications came in for the part-time positions. With these new applicants and the new positions filled, we are hopeful that we will be able to get to the point in 2023 that we consider ourselves fully staffed and able to maintain the required two deep coverage.

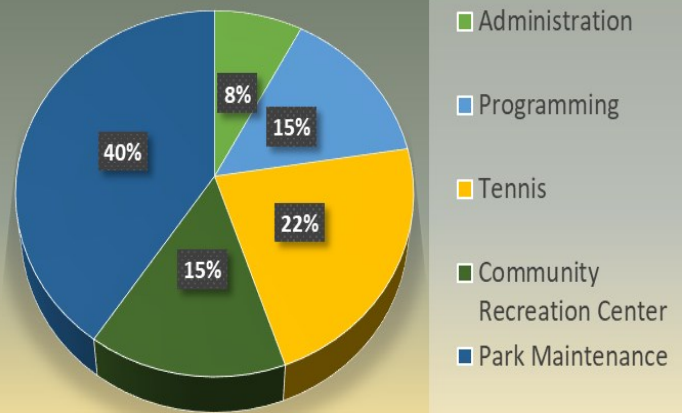
Staffing issues aside, our revenues bounced back since the pandemic and surpassed the revenues generated in 2019. Our participation number confirm that the community was happy to be back in action.

Generally speaking there was not much out of the ordinary in expenditures for 2022. The only significant change is that we change how the Tennis Pros are being paid. In the past, Tennis Pros collected money for private lessons and paid the Township for the court time used to conduct the lessons. Now, we collect the fees for private lessons and keep a percentage of that fee. Tennis Pros used to be included in the Township payroll for clinics and programs offered by the Township. Now they are strictly contractors in all aspects.

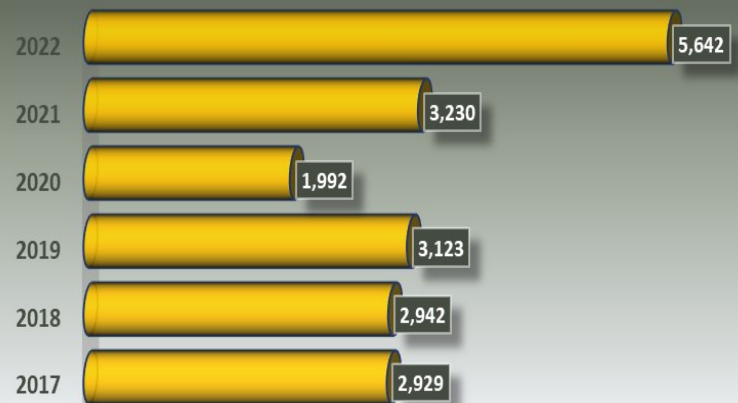

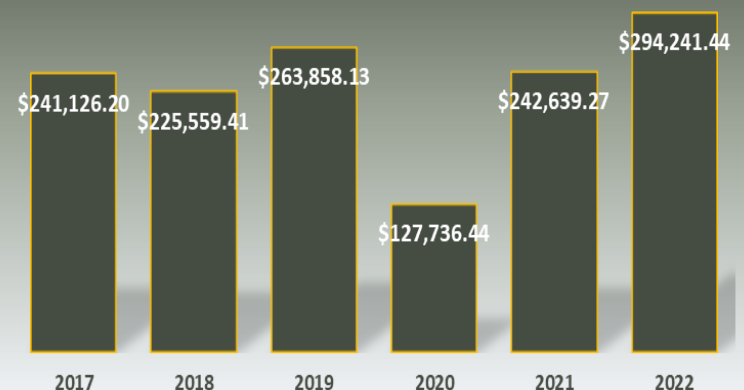
EXPENDITURES BY CATEGORY



NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS



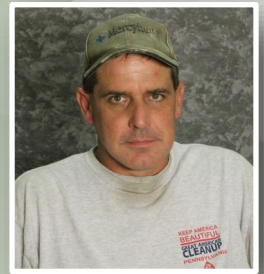

Programming

2022 brought us a lot of hope and excitement for new programs and events. With the world slowly going back to normal more and more people were getting involved in our events from one day programs to special events. We organized a Food Truck Friday in Peterswood Park on select Fridays each month during lunch time. This was a great event for the community to enjoy lunch outdoors and get more people out in the park. We had a great response from local businesses and residents that we plan to offer more Food Truck Friday's in the summer of 2023 and hope to bring in even more people to our park. A new programming/ advertising tool we began this year and plan to continue in 2023 is utilizing our bulletin board at the Recreation Center. Each session we have been creating interactive ways for our members to get more involved with the Parks and Recreation department on our bulletin board. The boy scouts sold concessions and their popsicles were a big hit on this warm day. We had a total of 18 different business/organizations participate in our event.

Our Fishing Derby was a fully booked event with 80 children ready to catch the biggest, smallest, most, and first fish! As the summer came to an end we prepared for one of our larger events, The Haunted Trail! Our amazing volunteers really stepped up and made this Terrifying Escape spooky and fun for all. The Kids Haunted Trail was also a big success. We limited registration and were fully booked for all the little ghouls and goblins to walk through the trail and greet all the actors. We had a total of 2,441 participants walk through our Haunted trail including the Kids Haunted Trail. Our last October event was Trick or Treat Trail. We had 39 local business and 246 children dressed in their very best Halloween costumes on this beautiful sunny weather day. The 2022 season ended with our Holiday Kickoff Event at the Recreation Center. Santa and Mrs. Claus posed for photos and with the help of the Library, Police, and Fire Department we had a fun night filled with crafts, games and sweet treats.



Amphitheater Events

The events at our outdoor amphitheater in Peterswood Park has undoubtedly become not only the highlight of the summer here in Peters Township, but a tradition! From young to old, we offer something for everyone starting in May all the way through October. This venue is truly a gem in our community and attracts visitors from all over.



Concerts

Wow! What a line-up! Our 10 concerts at the amphitheater kicked off on the last Wednesday of June and went through to the end of August. As you might imagine, weather can play a huge part in our movie nights, and thankfully we had fantastic weather in 2022. We featured Spider-man: No Way Home, Encanto, National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation, Sing 2, Dirty Dancing, Raya & The Last Dragon, Hocus Pocus, and Beetlejuice. After a long delay due to rain in 2021, we finally celebrated Christmas in July with National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation. We handed out free glowsticks and leis, free Kona Ice, and our very own Ryan Jeroski made his debut as Santa Claus! Ho ho ho!



Family Events

This year we featured three additional performances: Rock N Roll Pet Store, a kids' concert featuring Scott and Rosanna & Friends, and Exotic Edventures. These events are so much fun for young families in our community. The Rock N Roll Pet Store was perfect for our littlest audience and included music, puppets, and animals. Scott and Rosanna played familiar favorites for the kids to sing and dance along to. Exotic Edventures brought fascinating animals to the stage and provided lots of fun facts. These shows provide entertainment for kids, but a fun experience for the whole family.

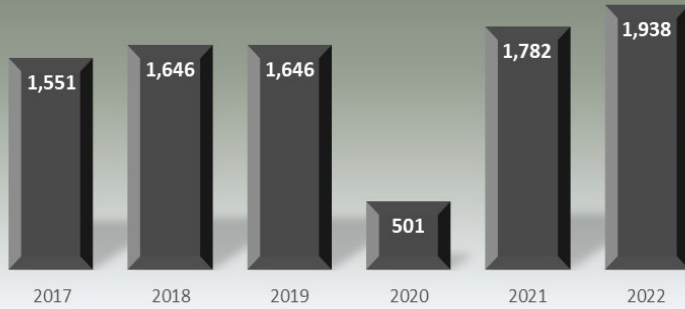
Bus Trips

Instructor Based Programming



By working with third party companies and instructors, we are able create new program opportunities for the township that our staff is not able to provide. These instructors and companies provide a huge bulk of our programming that we offer. We currently work with over 30 businesses and instructors that offer programs to all ages and groups. These partnerships provide our participants the opportunity to work with certified trainers, instructors, and teachers. Some instructors approach us with a program they wish to offer, while some instructors are recruited by the Parks and Recreation Staff. An instructor is not included in the Township payroll, they are paid a percentage of the participation fees through our accounts payable system and at the end of the year issued a W-2. Instructor based programming brought in over \$143,000 in revenue throughout 2022. Many companies like Mad Science of Pittsburgh and Little Medical School offer specialized STEM programs and summer camps to help children learn about science and medicine. Certified Dietitians, Laura Cordero and Suzie Bode, offer nutrition based programs that educate the participants with ways to stay fit and healthy! Kidokinetics teaches kids the basics to all different kind of sports as well as how their muscles and bodies work when playing them! These are just a few of the many programs offered through instructor based programming. We are constantly looking for certified instructors who specialize in fields that are relative to recreation and leisure services. Working with third party companies and instructors is one of the many ways we are able to provide top-notch programming to our community.



Community Recreation Center



The Community Recreation Center offers a variety of amenities including two full-size basketball courts, a 10th of a mile track located on the second floor, fitness room for classes, an indoor and outdoor accessible concession stand, conference room, classroom, and multipurpose room with a small kitchen. Also located at the Community Recreation Center are offices for most of the Parks and Recreation Staff. The building was host to 286 total rentals throughout the year. Renters included the Peters Township School District, Peters Township Sports Associations, In-house Programming, and the general public. These rentals included the use of the gym, multipurpose room, classroom, and conference room. The Community Recreation Center was able to accommodate birthday parties, basketball games, seasonal events, and various meetings throughout the year. We look to build on the quantity of rentals in the coming year.

This year provided many improvements to the Community Recreation Center. The parking lot area directly outside of the front of the Recreation Center was paved and parking spots were repainted. In addition, the front entrance received a new cement pad that leads to the parking lot and surrounding sidewalks. This gave the entrance updated look as guests enter the facility. 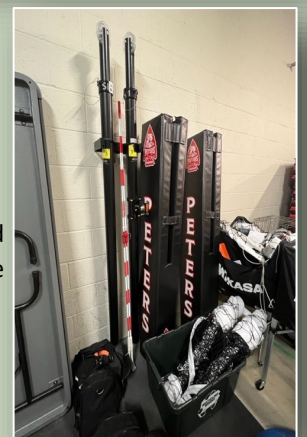
Front Desk Barrier

In 2020 when we were trying to get the Recreation Center re-opened after the two month shut-down, provisions were being made to make people including staff safe. We received some small barriers, but not enough to shield the front desk entirely. Planning had a left over sheet of plexiglass which we took and Public Works created a make shift barrier out of wood, that was clamped on to the back-side of the desk top. The barrier was great to get us back in action, but it was not a finished product and our Township Manager wanted something permanent there. So at the end of 2022 we had a permanent barrier installed that looks finished. This provides a permanent buffer between the public and front desk staff as well as a clean, modern appearance to the front desk.

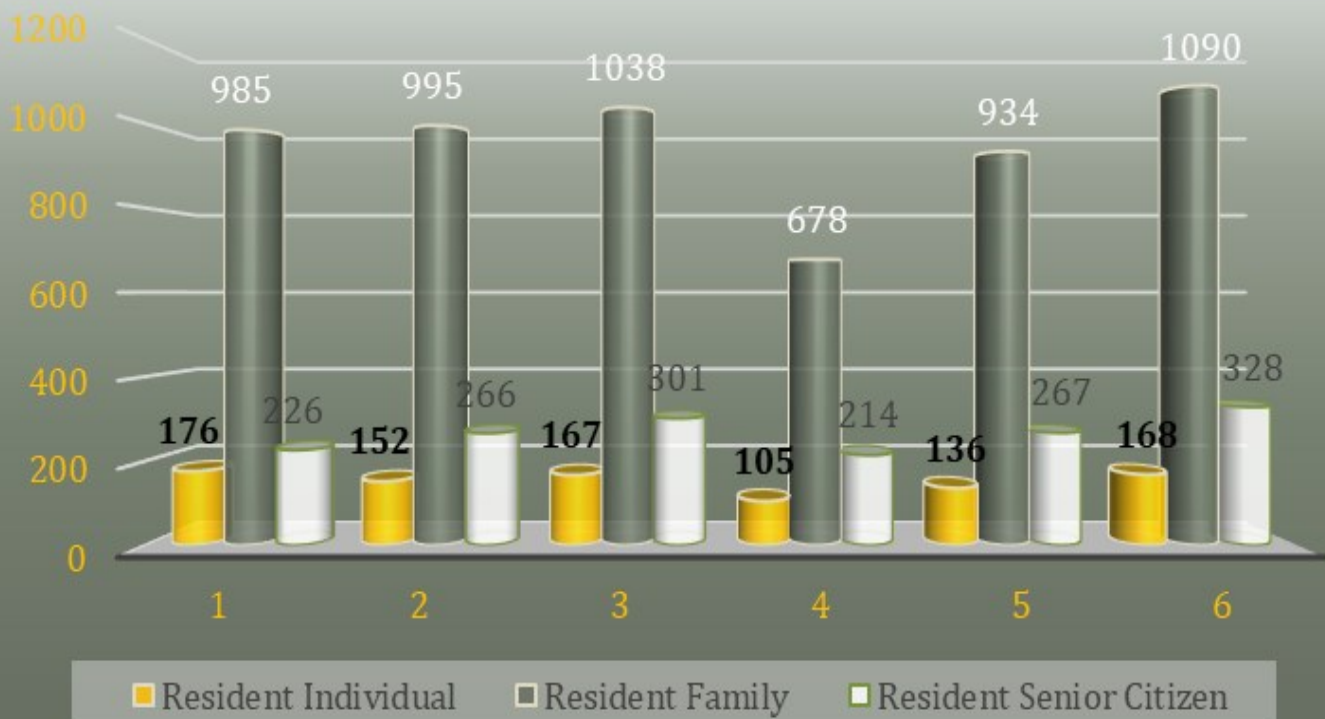


Volleyball Equipment

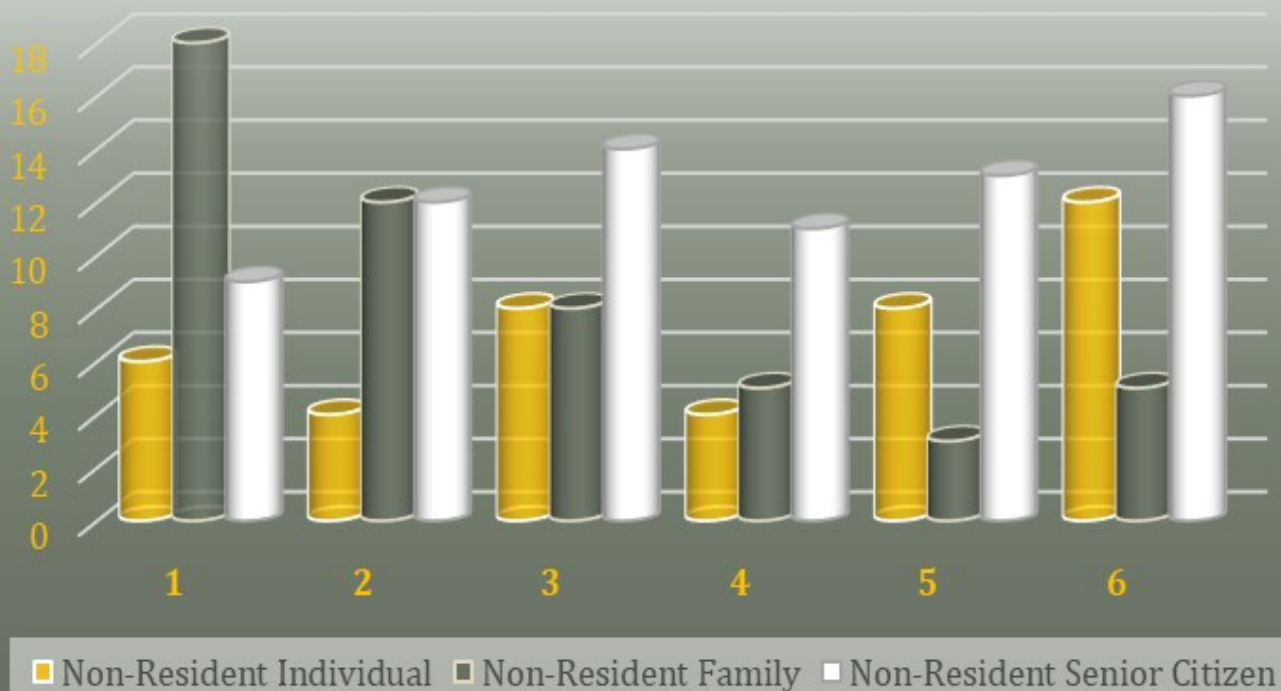
Since the Community Recreation Center was built, the only access we have had to volleyball was very heavy and cumbersome stanchions that did damage the floor if not used properly. Recently we added youth volleyball instruction, which has become a very popular and successful program. So in 2022 we installed brass covered floor anchors for a brand new volleyball net system on the left side of the gym. This system came highly recommended by our High School Athletic Department. This state of the art volleyball net system is now used for our various volleyball programs offered at the Community Recreation Center.

Tennis

2022 was an exciting year for the Peters Township Tennis Center. In February, we hired a new Racquet Sports Manager, Mike Schuster. Mike worked diligently to grow the Junior Development Program, hire additional instructors, and make a variety of improvements to the facility. Mike has also been hosting open meetings at the Tennis Center for players and residents to attend, where he provides updates on the facility as well as an open dialogue for any questions or feedback from our players.



Our Junior Development Tennis Program grew to its largest year ever for both revenue and participation. In addition to Bill Pilardi and Chuck Taylor, five more tennis instructors joined our facility this year – Mike Lechmanik, Dave Hogle, Lauren Masteller, Ian McCabe, and Hiromi Katayama. Our pickleball participation also grew significantly, with our pickleball courts being full several mornings each week, as well as beginner pickleball classes taught by instructor Laurel Heilman. Adult clinics on Sundays, Mondays, and Wednesdays were very popular as well as a new adult men’s league on Saturdays.

Our facility is being very well maintained and received some upgrades in 2022, with more to come in 2023. We made improvements to the electrical panels, and as a result, the lighting in our tennis bubble is much better this year. We also made some repairs to the interior of the bubble and the HVAC unit. The court conditions are much improved this year – our Full Time Attendant, Ian Sopko, has helped significantly with court maintenance. Feedback from players has been overwhelmingly positive about the improved clay court conditions.

We have also made efforts to update our facility’s online accessibility. Our Junior Development Program is now available online for registration along with frequent updates to our website. We recently added a new feature for online court reservations which is quickly growing in popularity. Players can now see court availability online in real-time and reserve a court from the convenience of their phone or computer. The tennis center is on a great path forward, and there are some big things in store for 2023!

Racquet Sports Manager

Mike Schuster was hired in February 2022 as Racquet Sports Manager. He previously was an instructor at the Mt. Lebanon Tennis Center for eight years, as well as serving on the Board of Directors of Indoor Tennis for Mt. Lebanon. Mike brought well-rounded experience in coaching lessons, junior clinics, tennis bubble operations, court maintenance, and more. Mike is looking forward to improving our facility both on and off court. Our Junior Development Program has already started growing significantly, and we are making improvements to both the clay courts and the hard courts. Be on the lookout for some new events at the Tennis Center this summer!



Park Maintenance

As we moved into 2022 it seemed like we had put the pandemic behind us. It was exciting to trend back to normal routines. The beginning of the year was normal, the crew dealt with numerous snow events where they maintained regular snow routes as well as cleared parking lots, sidewalks, the Arrowhead Trail and its accesses. Mixed in amongst the snow storms the crew kept active repairing broken water lines at several facilities and numerous facilities repairs at the CRC and several of the park restrooms. Tree removal and clean up also dominated the work load in the early portion of the year.



As we moved through winter into spring, March saw the opening of seasonal restrooms and water fountains and the application of herbicides and fresh mulch at our landscape islands and bench sites. Monthly playground inspections and the subsequent repairs also began this month and would continue through November. It seems as though the summer activities are beginning earlier each year. April saw the beginning of the spring sports seasons which meant athletic field maintenance began on all fields as soon as the weather would allow. Mowing at all park facilities also began in early April as well as spring landscaping at all facilities. With sports seasons beginning and shelter rentals the weekend custodial rotation to serve pavilions, restrooms and fields began at this time, much earlier than in seasons past. The crew cleans and stocks all restroom facilities daily and empties trash a minimum of 4 times a week throughout the summer.

As we moved into summer the crew helped with the tennis bubble take down and began to assist with the summer concert series, food trucks and the Friday night movies that would run through the summer. These programs have become very popular and the crew assists with placing trash and recycling cans, hanging banners, moving the movie screen and providing some traffic control to help things move along smoothly.

Along with the continued mowing, tree removal and landscaping the crew helped prepare and assist with the Peters Township Community Day, a welcome return that had been cancelled for several years due to the pandemic. As the summer wore on, alongside of the hectic summer maintenance schedule, the crew was also able to assist with the "Touch a Truck" program, they installed AED cabinets in all the park concession stands, poured concrete pads at fields 3 and 4 for ADA compliance, and repaired the boat launch at the lake. Before we knew it we were moving into fall which meant putting the tennis bubble back up. The crew assists with this project in several ways with the main objective being getting the lights and divider nets hung in the structure. The Haunted Trail occurs the first weekend in October and is a very popular event. The crew is very involved in this event with setting up scenes, props, bleachers, fences and operating the hayrides at the end of the event.

As the year came to a close, we put away our summer equipment and prepared the salt trucks, plows and spreaders for the upcoming snow. The finale to the 2022 year was the upgraded holiday light display set up at the Municipal Building and the Library, a nice way to signify the end of the year.

Parks and Recreation Board

In October 2021 we lost a long standing and integral part of the Parks and Recreation Board Pat Airhart. To say the least, the loss of Pat has left a huge void in the Parks and Recreation Board not just because of his longevity, but because he was so revered by not only our department but those in the sports groups and throughout our community. The Parks and Recreation Board wanted to do something to honor Pat, so they recommended to Council a couple of ideas including naming a shelter at the New Rolling Hills Park or the park road after Pat. Council was not ready to make a determination on those recommendations because the park is still under construction, however, they were willing to approve the request to name the Conference Room, where the majority of our meeting are held, in the Community



Recreation Center after Pat. The Parks and Recreation Board asked that Pat's most famous quote "Not on my watch" be included on the plaque to commemorate this naming in his honor. We worked with Beinhauer Funeral Home to order the plaque, they were very helpful and accommodating. The plaque is now hanging above the Conference Room door and will serve as a reminder of Pat's dedication to the Parks and Recreation Board.



The Peters Township Parks and Recreation Board is an advisory board created to advise and recommend to Peters Township Council in conjunction with the Parks and Recreation Director on policies and practices, promote recreation and park services, participate in initiation, review and recommending development and monitors the compliance from the sports associations. Three of the seven board members are recommended by Peters Township School Board. The intent of this method was to have involvement and input by individuals associated with the school because we work so closely with them by sharing fields, facilities and of course common participants.

The Parks and Recreation Board spends a significant amount of time reviewing the documentation from our 10 youth sports associations and dealing with issues as they arise. As stated in their by-laws they feel strongly that the purpose of its recreational sports programs is to encourage and develop in children a love for sports in a safe and positive environment, while teaching skill development, teamwork, and sportsmanship.

To fill the opening on the Board we welcomed two new members to the Parks and Recreation Board in 2022 first Brian Geyer then Sam Perlmutter.

Sports Associations



There are many ways that the Township and the Sports Associations work together. One way is when the sports associations propose and financially supports improvements to the fields or facilities that they utilize. At our Alliance Meeting In 2021 the Soccer Association indicated that they no longer needed the field at Venetia Park. The Baseball Association had asked to use that space to construct a baseball field. The Township and the Baseball Association worked together to start the conversion of the multi-purpose field at Venetia Park to what they decided ultimately to be 2 small Baseball fields. The project was completed in 2022 and put to use beginning in the fall.

There are 10 youth sports associations that the Parks and Recreation



Department works directly with. Each of those sports associations has it's own board and by-laws by which they are governed. Each association is required to provide the Parks and Recreation required documentation and follow our policies in order to utilize our fields and facilities as well as the School District's.

In November of 2022 the Parks and Recreation Director hosted a sports Alliance meeting. We ask that each association President and Documentation Coordinator attend the meeting or send other Board members in their place if they are unable to attend. A recommendation made at the last Alliance Meeting was to open a meeting up to all board members and coaches so they can learn our Policies and Procedures. So we invited all that were interested in attending to join us. These meetings provide an opportunity to discuss our policies and procedures and the documentation requirements to make sure we are all on the same page. It also offers networking between associations and the opportunity to share ideas as well as things that have worked or even not worked for them. It is the chance to ask and answer questions and have open dialog.



The Fire Department has some of the AED units that were previously in Township Buildings that have been replaced, so I asked if we could provide those units to the sports associations along with CPR/AED training and they happily agreed. There were 5 AED units and we have 5 concession stands throughout our parks, so the Fire Department refurbished the AED's, we purchased cabinets to house the units, installed them in the concession stands and they in place and ready for use in the fall of 2022.
